

Political Prisoners

Rasoul Dolati, originally from Yasuj in Kohgiluyeh and Boyer Ahmad Province, was abducted by Islamic Republic security forces in Shiraz on the afternoon of January 21, 2026. He was first taken to Plate 100 in Shiraz and later transferred to his hometown of Yasuj. He is currently being held by security forces in Yasuj, reportedly in solitary confinement at an intelligence detention facility, and no further information about his condition has been released so far.



News of the Day

The Baluchistan Human Rights Documentation Network reports that in the first month of 2026, hundreds of Baluch citizens were arrested, with 125 identities confirmed, including at least seven minors and nine women. Most arrests occurred during nationwide protests in Baluchistan and other Iranian cities. The report also documents at least 30 Baluch citizens killed or injured by military gunfire, including 16 deaths during protests. Among those killed were one child and one woman. The network stresses that these figures are likely underreported due to internet restrictions and security pressure.

Iran's Immortal Names

Dey 1404, western Tehran, Sadeghieh area, **Aida Heidari**, a student at Tehran University of Medical Sciences, was killed by the Islamic Republic. Images recorded in recent days from the examination hall of the Tehran Faculty of Medicine show that Aida's classmates went on strike and refused to participate in exams.



Children Targeted by Bullets

Killing of Children by the Islamic Republic

Parsa Hemmati, a 16 year old teenager, was abducted by regime affiliated forces on January 8 during protests in Kermanshah. Several days later, there is still no information available regarding his health condition or whereabouts.



Crime Against Children

The Coordination Council of Iranian Teachers' Trade Associations has issued a public call to document the cases of children who were killed, injured, or detained during the crackdowns of January 8 and 9. The council reports that it has so far identified and published the names of 163 children and adolescents who lost their lives. Families and witnesses are urged to submit their accounts to help fully document this organized crime. The council emphasizes that recording these testimonies is essential to breaking silence, confronting official denial, and preserving the truth, with the aim of pursuing collective justice and preventing these atrocities from being forgotten or repeated. According to the council, the names of more than 150 deceased children are currently available to the public via its Telegram channel and Twitter page.

Lawyers at Risk

Naser Rezaei Ahangarani, a lawyer and member of the Central Bar Association, shared photos on his Instagram account showing severe injuries and wrote: "The cost of bread, security, freedom."

The lawyer from Khorramabad was reportedly beaten by security and law enforcement forces during protests in the city on the evening of Saturday, January 3.
